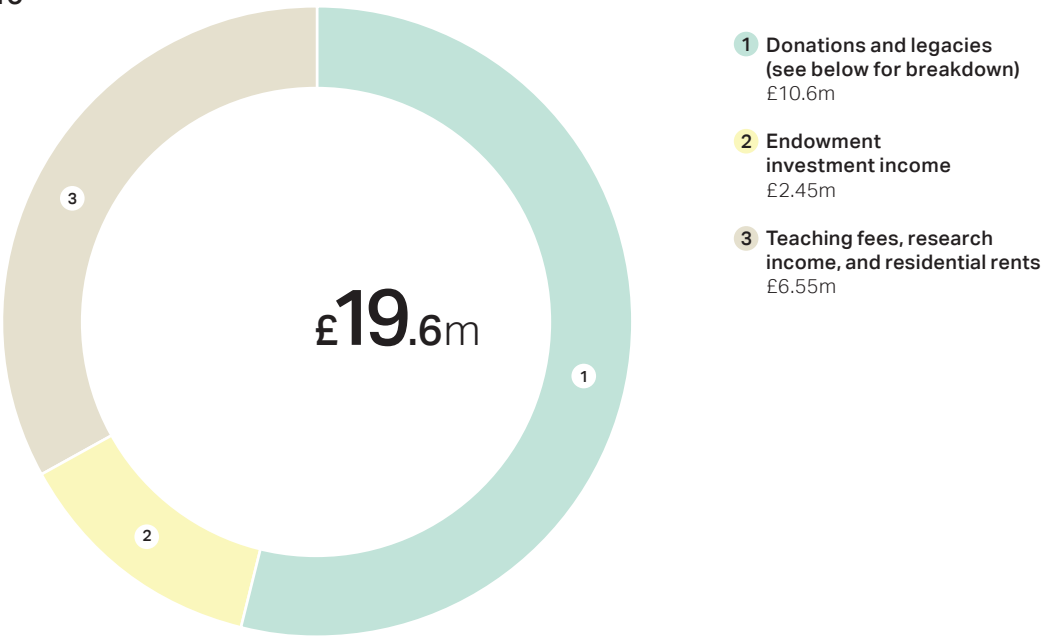

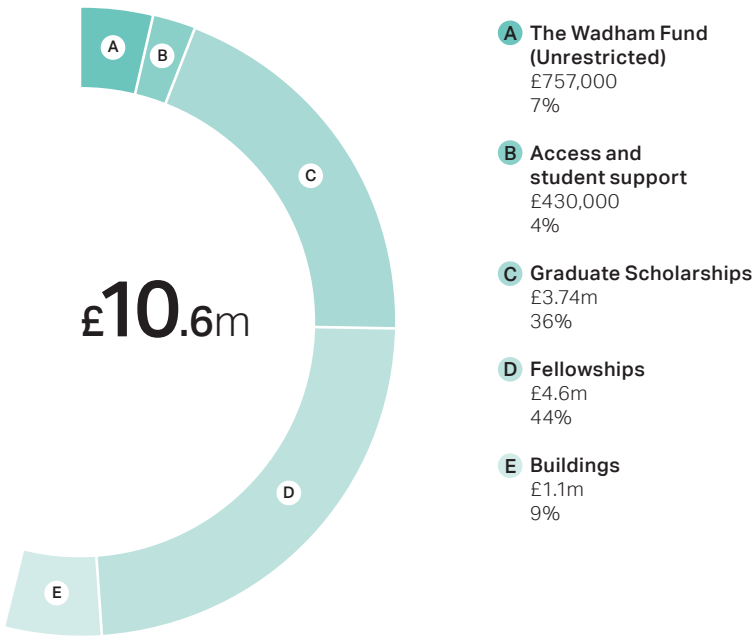
Wadham income and donations in 2015/16

In terms of new pledges in 2015/16, the College has received an additional £9.2m in gifts pledged for this and subsequent years and this represents another record for the College.

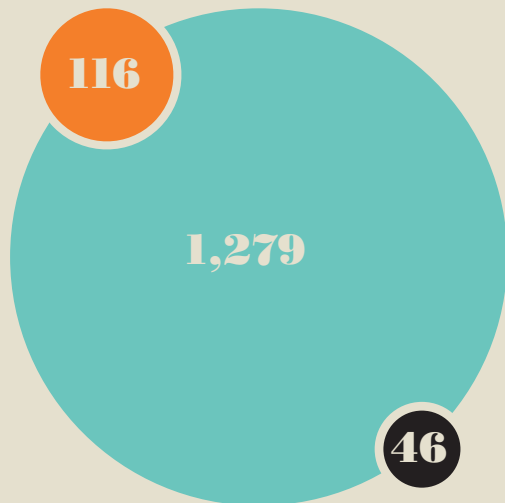
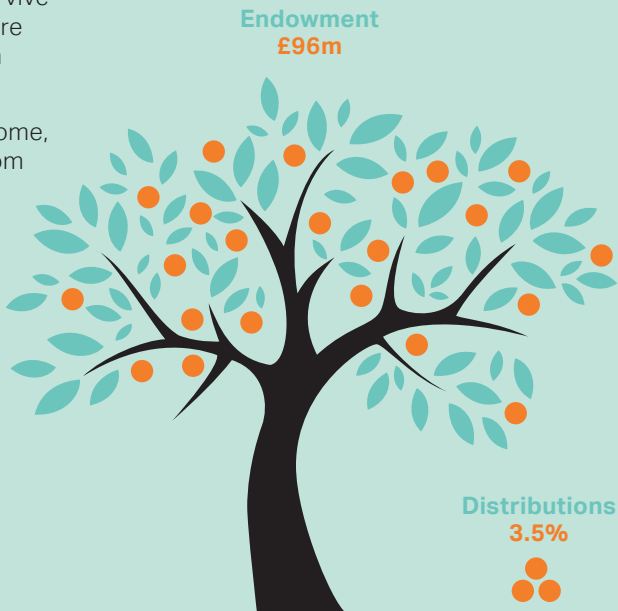


Looking after the Wadham endowment

Like most other Oxford colleges, Wadham is rich... but only on paper. Thanks to previous generations of donors, including our founders, we have an endowment fund of £96 million. But we rely on the revenue it generates to survive every year. In fact, 24% of our total expenditure in 2015/16 was covered by distributions from the endowment.

By careful investment and only spending income, future generations will continue to benefit from this long tradition of philanthropy.

How your donations add up

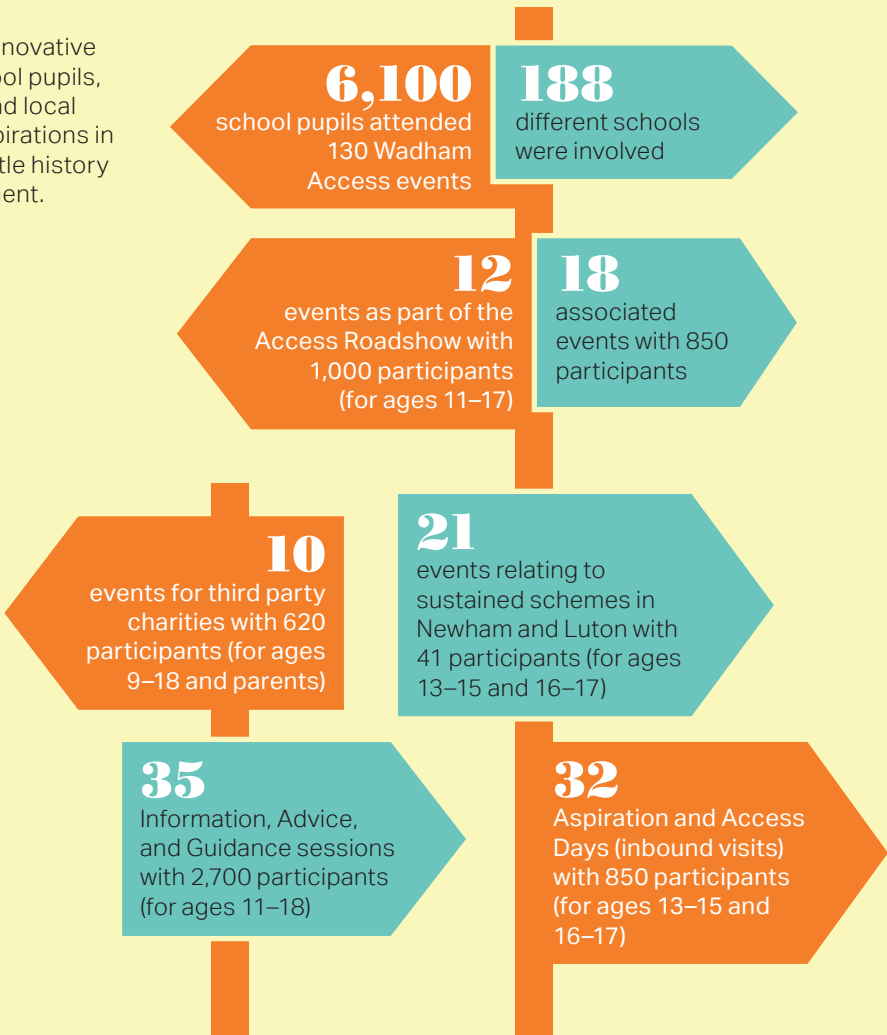
The Wadham Fund is a way for alumni to give support directly to current students – with donations ranging from £5 a month to £5,000 a year or more. Gifts go towards hardship grants and the College's ambitious Access to Excellence programme, which includes sustaining the costly tutorial system. In 2015/16, 22% of all alumni contributed a total of over £750,000 to the Wadham Fund – and our thanks go out to them all.

Moving in the best circles

Wadham has three membership "circles" designed to recognise those who give generously and regularly to the College. The Nicholas and Dorothy Circles (named after our founders) acknowledge those who have given £1,000+ or £5,000+ respectively in the previous financial year. The Wilkins Circle (named after our celebrated and long-serving seventeenth-century Warden) is for those who have given consecutively for at least the past three years or have set up a regular ongoing donation. Thank you to the total of 1,441 Wadham alumni who currently belong to one or more Circles!

Wadham receives its largest ever gift

The College has received its largest ever legacy benefaction since its foundation – a bequest from alumnus and Foundation Fellow David K. Richards (PPE, 1961). This extraordinarily generous gift will keep alive the memory of a wise and visionary man, who died of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis on 19 March 2015 in Santa Monica, aged 75.

David Richards' legacy will help transform research at Wadham and Oxford in several areas, with particular focus on interdisciplinary research into the academic fields which he and his wife Carol wanted to encourage: climate science and economic history. The Warden expressed his admiration in this year's *Gazette*: "David and his family have been wonderful supporters and benefactors to the College over many years. A man of high intelligence, grace and humanity, he will be very much missed. His legacy to the College will enable Wadham to support and advance knowledge and discovery in his chosen areas for decades to come. The scholarly work that is done in our College in David's name will stand as its own lasting tribute to his memory and to our pride in our association with such a remarkable man".

An investment manager, philanthropist and supporter of research on a wide range of issues, David was also one of the first alumni to support the professionalisation of the College's fundraising efforts, and he was an outstanding benefactor to the College in his lifetime, believing passionately in its role as a dynamic intellectual community. He led the way by example and encouraged others to follow. His legacy donation will endow six new doctoral scholarships and four Fellowship posts in the fields of chemistry, climate research, economic history, economics, and interdisciplinary history – commemorating David and his wide range of interests in perpetuity.

Welcome to our new Finance Bursar

As of Michaelmas Term 2016, Wadham has a new Finance Bursar. Dr Peter Alsop studied engineering at Cambridge, before embarking on a DPhil at Oxford, followed by a long career in industry overseas. From now on he will be responsible for the College finances and stewardship of all donations to Wadham. Peter says he's been impressed by the way Wadham's finances have been managed – and also by the amazing generosity of our donors.

But is managing a college's finances really so different from running a business? "While companies sell something at market value to make money, Wadham is a charity which delivers social value," he answers. "And we get paid far less than it costs to do this. So, yes – we're not a business!"

Nonetheless Peter is ready for the new career challenge of looking after an endowment (see page 8). "It's a balancing act between present and future needs," he says. "While today's students are more financially stretched than previous generations – unless government policy changes radically – tomorrow's students will need even more help."

Stop press: annual phone campaign breaks record!

This is really news for next year's report, but it's so good that we want to share it right now. During the annual two-week telephone campaign in September 2016, some 600 alumni spoke with our student callers and pledged a record-breaking total of £330,000 to the Wadham Fund.

Conversations ranged from tips for tutorials and careers to deep discussions of philosophy and human psychology. As caller Shayaan Rehman (Jurisprudence, 2015) remarked: "From speaking to Wadham alumni I have found an overwhelming love for the College – its ethos, people and culture. I certainly feel luckier to be a part of a truly special network."

Raising aspirations and attracting talent

Q: What kind of day lasts a lifetime?
A: A Wadham Aspiration Day

Research shows that, when it comes to raising the aspirations of 11–18 year-olds, sustained action works best. Hence our 32 Aspiration Days in 2015/16, attended by 833 school pupils, all of them thanks to you! These events bring groups from our target schools on a Wadham visit tailored to their age group: tours, meetings with students, academic taster sessions and advice about getting into university. When they are older, we invite them back again, and again. The idea is that the brightest and best will return and, even if they don't apply to us, they will have a better chance of going to a top university – and higher aspirations throughout their lives.

Wadham tutors go back to school in Luton

One of Wadham's latest innovations is the pre-16 outreach project or 'the Luton Project' – devised by Access and Outreach Officer, Emily Cannon with the support of generous donors. "Very few young people from Luton apply to Oxford, so we're targeting groups of 24 14–16 year-olds over two years," says Emily. "During the first year, Wadham tutors run eight after-school taster sessions in unfamiliar subjects – like Materials, Archeology or Classics. Then the students have a day at College and do a summer project on a topic that grabs them, before embarking on the second-year 'curriculum' of A level choices and university applications."

The first class has entered its second year and a new cohort has just started. So it will be a while before we see the long-term results. But already, there is evidence of impact.

"At the beginning, only 38% of the students said they thought that 'people like them' went to Oxford," explains Emily. "But after the first year, the figure went up to 87%."

From Islington IntoUniversity

With the help of our donors, Wadham has collaborated with Corpus Christi College, Cambridge and four leading independent schools to create a new Learning Centre in Islington. Run by national education charity *IntoUniversity*, the Centre – which opened in September 2016 – aims to support disadvantaged young people into university through after-school academic support, mentoring and workshops designed to raise aspirations.

Islington is one of the areas allocated to Wadham by the University for outreach (see page 9). It has the third-highest level of child poverty in England, so we believe the Centre will make a real impact. As far as we know, too, it is the first time that Oxford and Cambridge colleges have worked together so closely on such a project – another cause for celebration!

Summer students blossom into undergraduates

We're proud to report that donors have enabled our highly successful Summer Schools in Classics, Engineering and PPE to run once again in 2016. Each week-long course requires £25,000 support to run and enables sixth-formers from state schools in our allocated regions (see page 9) to discover a subject they might not have considered studying at university.

We're even prouder to report that previous years' donations are now bearing fruit. As well as Summer School alumnus Gage Kumar, featured in last year's report, in October 2016 we welcomed not one but two 2015 participants (Dhanya Nair and Taiwo Oyebola) back to College... this time as Classics freshers.

Targeting Europe's mathematical talent

Another Wadham 2016 summer programme assembled 24 talented 16–19 year-olds from throughout Europe to develop their mathematical "PROMYS". The annual six-week PROgram in Mathematics for Young Scientists is lead-funded by the Clay Institute but could not take place without your donations, which enable the brightest and best in Europe to learn from each other – as well as from some of Oxford's greatest minds – about topics such as three-dimensional algebras and the calculus of finite differences. "We have seen a different approach to maths," said one of this year's participants from Finland. "The course is fast-paced with some tricky problems. It has been great fun... and we work together rather than competing."

Nurturing our community

Biology undergraduate goes wild for research

This year, two lucky Wadham Biology undergraduates got the chance to sample life as research scientists. The Whall Summer Biological Research Studentships offer a stipend for an eight-week project, working with College tutors. One of the 2016 beneficiaries was Yann Newby (Biology, 2015), who is now determined to start a research career, once he graduates. Over the long vacation, he carried out research into the clouded leopard, a rare species of big cat that lives in Malaysia... and all from the safety of a laboratory in Oxford! His secret? Movement-activated cameras hidden throughout the forest – and one very visionary donor.

The power of bursaries

In 2015/16 one in five Wadham undergraduates received a means-tested bursary. This adds up to over £250,000, provided by donors through the Wadham Fund and those who give major donations (see page 8). One recipient was Rebecca Rose. She has just entered the final year of her Law degree and sends her thanks to all who gave: "Growing up on a farm in rural Devon, I didn't know anybody, other than my teachers, who had been to university. I personally could not have come to Wadham without the grants I receive."

The dog who disburses hardship funds

Meet Jonah, a young Cockapoo, who arrived in College during Finals season, 2016. He's the latest recruit to the welfare team, where he shares an office with Chaplain Wendy Wale. And he's something of an innovation in the field of hardship-fund disbursement.

"We're very grateful to everyone who contributes to hardship grants through the Wadham Fund," explains Wendy, who is a qualified counsellor and available to support students from all faiths or none. "But we're constantly looking for ways of making sure that funds really get to those who need them." For some people, coming to cuddle Jonah could be the first step in reaching out for financial help.

"So far, the freshers have gone bananas for him," says Wendy. "And several Finalists came sobbing to Jonah after a bad paper. But we believe he can make much more of an impact."

Best of all Jonah is keen to work for free. Hertford College has a cat who is rumoured to receive a stipend, but donors will be pleased to learn that Jonah provides his services free of charge – in return for walks in the College Garden.

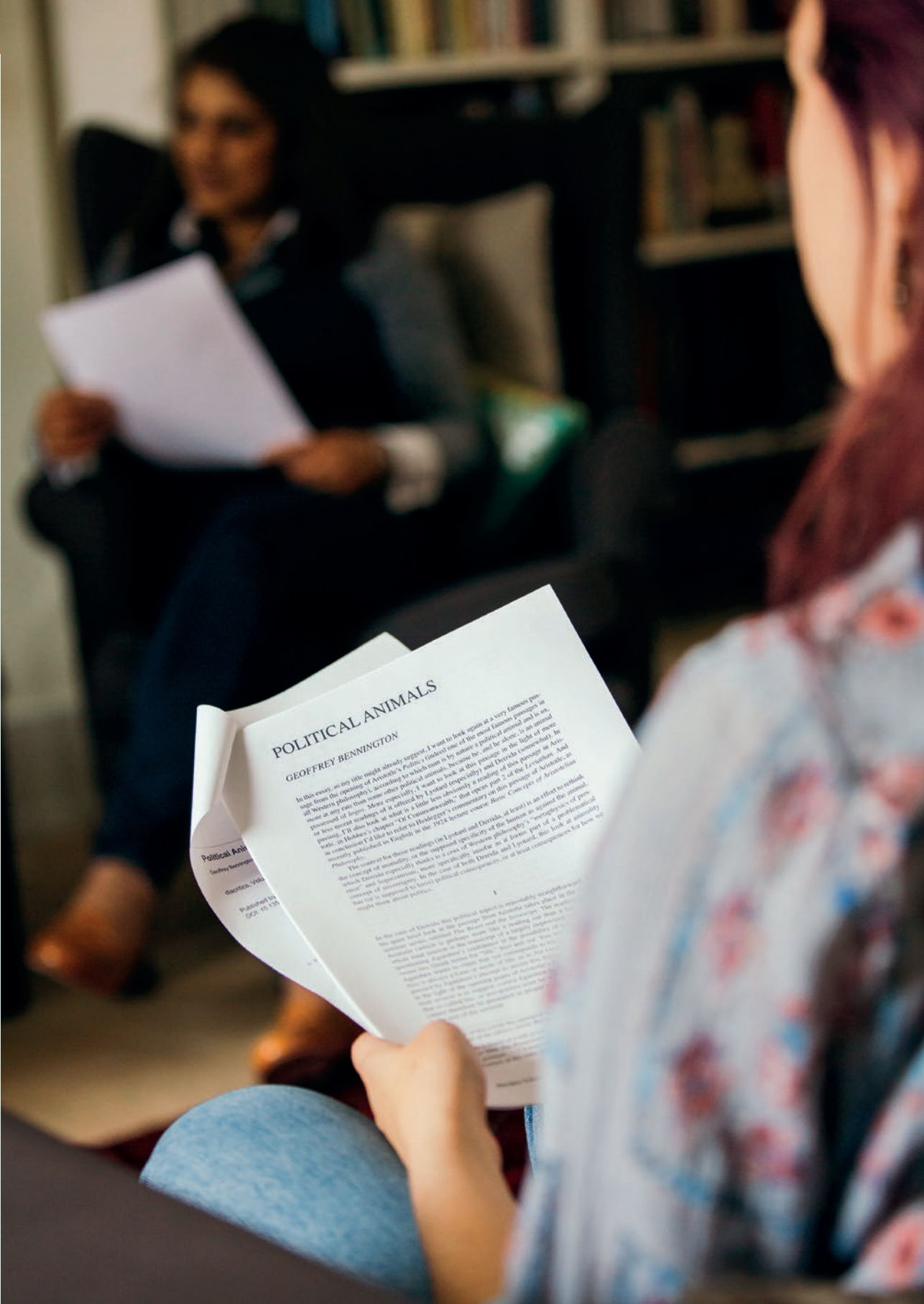

Graduate scholarships double in number (and need)

"Postgraduate education is a real time-bomb in terms of social mobility," said Alan Milburn, MP, the UK's so-called "social mobility tsar" in 2012. And 2015/6 was the year the bomb went off. In other words, members of the first generation of UK undergraduates to pay £9,000 a year in fees embarked on their graduate studies.

"The other thing that's happened recently is that the job market has changed," says Dr Mike Froggatt, Wadham's Academic Administrator. "Now that so many people have a first degree, a Masters degree is how you distinguish yourself. And most Masters students have traditionally been self-funded."

In other words, graduate scholarships have become as much about access as excellence. The good news, however, is that – thanks to our donors – the number of scholarships offered by Wadham has doubled over the last four years. Now almost one in five of our graduate students is able to thank donors for their support.

New scholarships for Africa

In 2015/16, Wadham formed a new partnership with the Beit Trust to provide up to two full scholarships (fees, airfares and living expenses) for Masters students from Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Crucially, recipients will be expected to show evidence of their intention to return home after graduation to ensure that their own societies reap the benefit of their Oxford education. We are grateful to the Trustees for choosing Wadham as their first Oxford University partner and look forward to receiving our first Beit Scholars in 2017. Matched funding for the first years of this scheme has been secured thanks to Wadham donors, and we hope more alumni will help extend the partnership into the future.

Matched funding for graduate scholarships



More than one in three students admitted to Oxford at graduate level turn down their offers due to financial concerns.

Scholarships are the obvious solution. Wadham has been offered matched funding opportunities for scholarships on a 50:50 basis, doubling the impact donors can make. If a donor (or group of donors) is able to give £15,000, Wadham will receive matching funds making it up to the full cost of a one-year scholarship for a Home or EU student.

The magic effect of fee waivers

In 2015/16, 11 outstanding doctoral students were awarded £4,000 "fee waivers" for the next academic year – thanks to some particularly canny donors. With the total annual cost of studying estimated at up to £30,000 for UK/EU residents, £4,000 may seem a drop in the ocean. However, it can make all the difference in securing truly top students for Wadham. This is because the UK research councils offer full grants for living expenses and University fees to excellent students – but not Oxford college fees. It's a simple calculation: the more fee waivers we can offer, the better our chances of getting the brightest graduates.



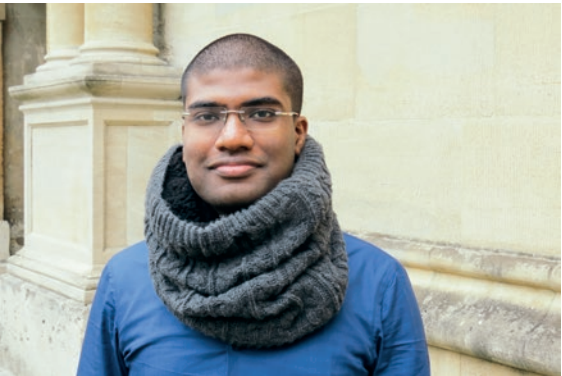

A gift for law

Now he's one of two Oxford-Hackney Scholars at Wadham – thanks to hundreds of Wadham alumni who made donations in honour of Jeffrey Hackney, long-standing Law Tutor and Emeritus Fellow of the College. Through the Oxford Graduate Scholarship Matched Fund, the fund grew to create an endowment of close to £1 million, further enhancing Wadham's strength in Law.

"Providing scholarships is a wonderful way of giving back," says Shiva. "I am thankful to all those who take up the responsibility to enable others. Those that benefit from scholarships, like me, will go on to help the next generation by funding further merit-based scholarships." It seems that the Hackney Scholarships will be a classic example of a gift that keeps on giving.

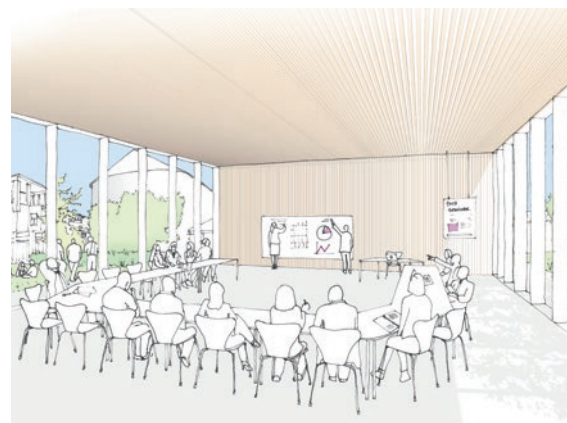
Two transformational pledges from Hong Kong

Wadham has long wanted to improve the tired 1950s buildings of the Back Quad, also known as the Goddard Building, and the JCR, which are no longer fit for purpose. Now some amazing gifts and pledges, totalling over £8 million, from Hong Kong donors will enable our wish to come true. The new William Doo Undergraduate Centre will provide study space and a JCR to match the standards of the McCall MacBain Graduate Centre across the Back Quad, while the adjoining Dr Lee Shau Kee Building will become the focus for Wadham's access and outreach activities. We are deeply grateful to William Doo (Law, 1993) and his family, as well as to Honorary Fellow Dr Lee Shau Kee for lead-funding the projects.

Following a competition, Wadham has asked internationally acclaimed architect Amanda Levete from AL_A to develop designs for the replacement of the JCR and Goddard Building (staircases 16 and 17). An independent feasibility study has been carried out to ensure that the new buildings will be as cost effective as possible, and that elements of the existing buildings can be retained. Subject to the necessary consents, the College proposes that the new buildings will create a state-of-the-art Undergraduate Centre on the Wadham site, including a new Junior Common Room and bedrooms, as well as an Aspiration Centre to accommodate the increasing number of visiting school students attending access and outreach events, such as Summer Schools and Aspiration Days.

The development is part of Wadham's Access to Excellence programme which supports students on every step of the academic journey, from the moment they consider applying to university, through their time at Oxford and on into their careers.

Warden Ken Macdonald QC comments: "As we welcome the brightest students from a wide range of backgrounds we want them to feel that they are benefitting from the very best facilities that an Oxford education can offer. We want Wadham to inspire potential applicants in every way, providing our students with the means to achieve the most benefit from their time here." There is much work to be done over the coming year before we can share

the detailed plans, but the College continues a process of consultation and review to ensure that we secure wonderful buildings which properly meet the needs of the College and enhance the beauty of the Back Quad.

Wadham alumni and friends are also generously committing to help close the funding gap for the project by naming student rooms, floors and other spaces in the new buildings. We hope that many of our alumni will want to be involved in the building appeal and we will shortly be sharing news about the development.

The College would like to express its sincere gratitude to Dr Lee Shau Kee and to William Doo and their families for enabling these proposals to move ahead.

The gift of hindsight?

We are pleased to welcome Judy Stephenson to Wadham. She is the very first David Richards Junior Research Fellow in Economic History, appointed thanks to the munificent bequest of alumnus, David Richards (see page 11). Judy researches labour markets in England before 1800, but her work offers lessons for today. For example, it turns out that the "gig economy" characterised by Uber, is nothing new. Judy says: "Before 1800 very few people had a job. They were paid for piecework rather than their time. It's traditionally the way capitalists protect themselves from risk and workers get flexibility." So who came out of it better? Judy's answer is unsurprising: in the long run the business owners were the winners.

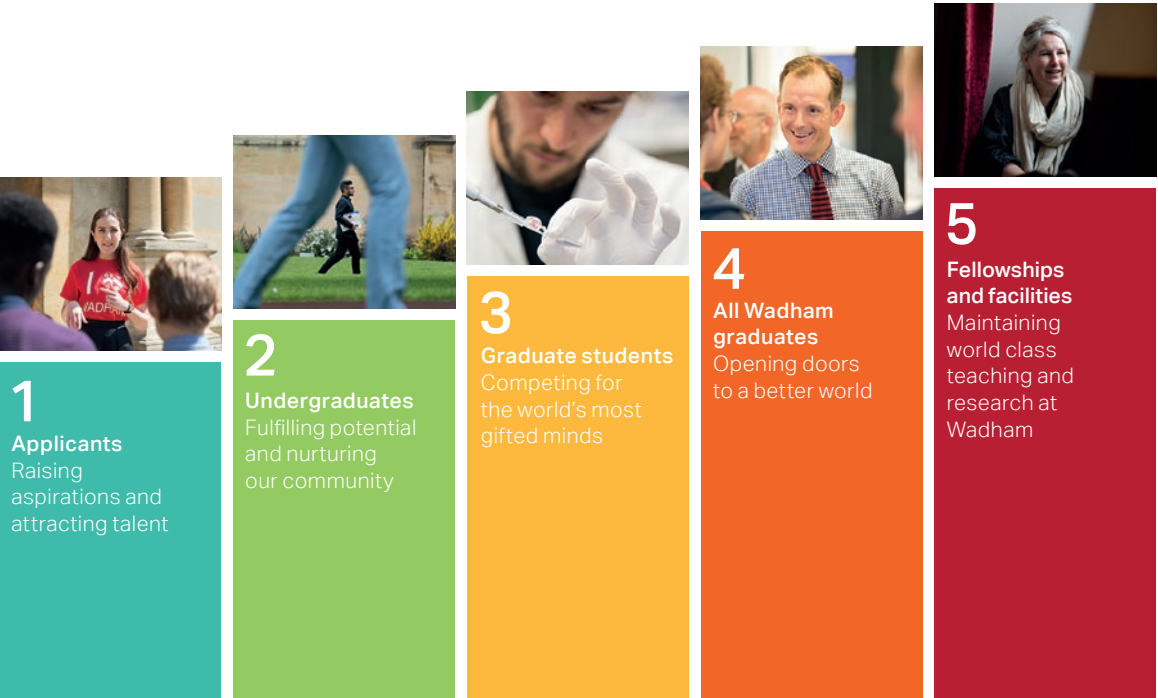
Strategic update

Access to Excellence strategy: the story so far

In our last report, we announced the College's new five-step Access to Excellence strategy. Supported by your generosity, our mission is to attain the highest standards of scholarship by finding the best students – even where others might not look – and nurturing their talent at Wadham and beyond. The broad-ranging strategy covers everything from one-day pre-16 access events and funding for graduate scholarships, to permanent facilities and endowed fellowships.

We are now delighted to announce that the official Access to Excellence launch took place on 2 July 2016 in Oxford – with presentations by experts in educational access and social mobility from the College and beyond. Wadham has commissioned The Bridge Group, a social mobility think-tank, to help us analyse the impact of our recent work. Statistically, Wadham was responsible for over 5% of the entire University's access activities last year, but our aim is to ensure that your support also has the maximum possible effect in the future.

In the meantime, the great news is that – thanks to all the donors who contributed to our record-breaking fundraising year – we are now £25 million of the way to our Access to Excellence target of at least £30 million.

"When he died, my father split his modest legacy four ways: a quarter each for his children – and a quarter for Wadham. It has been a privilege to be involved in this process.

To have all the hard work I put into my studies over the last year recognised in this way is especially humbling.
