Photo: Giovanna Truong (2023, PG Modern Languages). The 'living fossil' Metasequoia glyptostroboides is a rare deciduous redwood, which thrives in damp conditions and flood plains. Known from the fossil record but long thought to be extinct, it was identified and rediscovered in the wild in south-central China in a long process over the 1940s involving multiple scientists. Surviving trees are endangered in the wild by logging, loss of habitat to rice paddies, and ecosystem degradation. It is instantly recognisable from the distinctive swirly tendency of its trunk and branches, lush, feathery, pinnate leaves, long golden tassels of pollen, and tiny round seed cones.
